RAPAD Board Heads to Bedourie in August While in Longreach, Mayor Murray joined fellow RAPAD Mayors and tourism operators on the banks of the Thompson River to hear from the Tourism Minister Powell on the newly launched Destination 2045 Tourism Plan.

On 26–27 August, the Diamantina Shire will proudly host the Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) in Bedourie. In recent years, the RAPAD Board has adopted a rotating approach to its inperson meetings, sharing the travel load across member councils and giving each region the chance to showcase its local achievements, communities, and priorities.

This rotation not only helps 'share the distance' but also brings direct benefits to each host town, with around 30 participants expected, including project partners and departmental representatives. The meeting is a welcome opportunity to support local businesses and accommodation providers and shine a light on the projects shaping our part of Central West Queensland.

The two-day agenda will include meetings of the CWQ Regional Pest Management Group, RAPAD Water and Sewerage Alliance, and the CWQ Regional Roads and Transport Group—reflecting the cross-sector collaboration that RAPAD is known for.

This marks the second time Diamantina has hosted the Board, following Birdsville's previous welcome to members in August 2022. We look forward to welcoming the RAPAD Board once again—this time to Bedourie.



Mayor Francis Murray took the opportunity to raise concerns about housing in the Diamantina Shire at the June RAPAD Board meeting in Longreach. He emphasised the critical role that the Council plays in meeting local needs and bridging gaps in social housing, needs that are not always reflected in official data, to Sarah Amos, Deputy Director General of the Department of Housing, who presented to the Board about Social and Affordable Housing Supply.





New Chapter for Our Parks: Council Hands Over Management of Birdsville and Bedourie Tourist Parks

A new era has begun for our local tourism facilities, with the formal handover of the Birdsville Tourist Park and Bedourie Tourist Park to IVG Global Pty Ltd (IVG). IVG's track record in venues includes Australian pavilions at three world expos and over 30 tourism, leisure, and cultural projects across Australia. Their roster of events has included Olympic and Paralympic Games, Universiades, Fl, Formula E and Grand Slam tennis events.

IVG is led by a passionate, energetic, and highly experienced management team with worldwide experience. While they will bring this global experience to the management of the Parks, their leadership team is very focused on the local community and what is important to the region.

The handover milestone was marked with a gathering at the Wirrarri Visitor Information Centre in Birdsville, the first of many collaborative meetings between Diamantina Shire Council and the new lessees. This change in management follows Council's call for Tenders last December, inviting proposals to manage the two parks. With this transition now complete, Council has achieved a significant target from the 2024–2025 Operational Plan: 'Sites divested – 100%', as listed under Item 3.2.2.

This achievement means all three major visitor accommodation sites, the Birdsville Lodge, Birdsville Tourist Park and Bedourie Tourist Park, are now under lease arrangements. These divestments are part of Council's long-term strategy to support economic growth, enable private sector innovation, and ensure sustainable service delivery in the Shire.

Operational Plans, such as the 2024/2025 edition, are important tools that help Council turn strategy into action, and this successful handover is a strong example of how planning drives real outcomes. Community members are encouraged to stay informed and engaged by following Council's ongoing progress through the recently endorsed 2025/2026 Operational Plan. These documents reflect Council's commitment to transparency, accountability, and delivering on the goals that matter to our community.

A Window to the Past: "**Birdsville - The Black Book"** Exhibition to Open at Wirrarri

A new museum-style exhibition is shining a spotlight on Birdsville's unique character and history through the eyes of a woman who fell in love with the outback town nearly 60 years ago. "Birdsville – The Black Book" will open to the public on Tuesday, 8 July at the Wirrarri Visitor Information Centre Gallery. The exhibition is based on Frances Gage McGinn's 1977 book, "Birdsville", affectionately known as the Black Book.

Preserving History

As the dust jacket explains:

Frances Gage McGinn established immediate rapport with Birdsville and the desert environs in 1966. A continued interest fostered [the book], about a place that 'lies wide a thousand miles', set in quiet splendour all its own, beneath the wide arc of the ever changing western sky.

As a Bundaberg woman who settled in Brisbane, McGinn took an interest in the remote beauty of Birdsville, staying several times over the next ten years. At that time, she realised that Birdsville itself did not have a published history, so she dedicated herself to researching the many and varied stories she encountered. Her efforts culminated in a book rich with stories told with an integrity that has stood the test of time, accompanied by photographs that lend credence to her words, and paintings that capture her sense of a place that transforms dramatically with just a change in perspective, the time of day, or the season.






CUC RAPAD CWQ, a proud part of the Country Universities Centre network, supports students throughout Central West Queensland. Our hubs span nearly 25% of Queensland, and you'll find us in Barcaldine, Bedourie, Birdsville, Blackall, Boulia, Longreach, Jundah, and Winton.

We kicked things off on 14 December 2024, when Federal Treasurer The Hon Jim Chalmers and Senator Anthony Chisholm joined us in Longreach to officially launch the CUC RAPAD CWQ network and open our first hub. It was action stations from there, opening and enrolling our first Longreach student on 17 February and our Jundah, Birdsville, and Bedourie hubs soon after. Of course, no great adventure is without its challenges—cue tech hiccups and an unprecedented weather event. Our Winton and Boulia hubs quickly adapted, opening to stranded students, those sitting exams, and anyone needing a connected space to work. Just five weeks after opening, Jundah was repurposed as a base for the Disaster Recovery team. By May, the rollout was complete—Boulia led the charge, followed by Winton, Barcaldine, and Blackall. Each hub opened with students already enrolled, which shows just how needed these spaces are. With all eight hubs now up and running, we're excited to settle into our roles and support students across the Central West on their study journeys. This is only the beginning!





Our road crews have been working hard, and everything is progressing well as we repair and prepare roads for our upcoming event season, including the inaugural Birdsville Camel Carnival in July.

Most roads have now reopened following recent rain and flooding. While all Main Roads are in relatively good shape, we see significant drainage damage across many Shire roads and ongoing repairs. We appreciate the community's patience as we continue this critical work to ensure safe travel throughout the region.

Maintenance Crews

Operating with one grader, our maintenance crew has been doing emergent works on the Betoota to Mooraberree Road. Prior work included drainage repairs and a light formation grade on the Birdsville to Betoota Road. This crew will be joined by two water trucks, rollers, another grader, and a supervisor to commence Heavy Formation Grading from Betoota toward Birdsville. The road is holding up well for now, but with increased cattle transport and tourist traffic, regular maintenance will be essential. This team will also maintain the surrounding Shire roads and may be redirected to assist with the Cuttaburra Bitumen Project if required.

A second crew has been working on the Springvale to Diamantina Lakes Road, undertaking Flood Damage Restoration Works. They will continue restoration works along the Diamantina Lakes to Winton Boundary Road. In the coming weeks, a dozer will begin stockpiling gravel in the area to support these repairs. Once this section is complete, the crew will move on towards Davenport.

Patrol Grader Crew

This team has completed grading the Lake Machattie Road and is currently working on Adria Downs Access Road. Their next focus will be the Carcoory Stoney Crossing Road, followed by a Heavy Formation Grade on the Griffith Tank to Coorabulka Road. The crew includes a grader, a multi-roller, and two water trucks. We are monitoring the Bedourie to Monkira Road—if conditions deteriorate, this team will be reassigned to maintain it. One grader has been temporarily reassigned from this crew to carry out emergent work on the Bedourie to Boulia Road, repairing bitumen edge scouring and washouts. Two tippers are carting gravel from Kamaran Pit to support these works, and a dozer addresses washouts at key floodways.



Civil Crew

Currently focused on signage repairs and emergent bitumen patching on the Birdsville to Betoota Road, our Civil Crew will assist the town crew with event preparations over the coming weeks. Between events, they will continue to conduct signage and bitumen repairs on all Main Roads throughout the Shire.

Contractors

- A contractor grader has been working on the Bedourie to Sandringham Road, reopening the route through emergent works. He has completed the Sandringham to Ethabuka Road and will move on to Kamaran Downs Access Road, then complete the degrass work on Bedourie to Boulia Road.
- Another contractor grader and tipper started on Monday, June 9, working on the Birdsville to Betoota Road. They are carting gravel into floodways and low-lying areas from the Birdsville Racecourse sandhill to 9 Mile Cutting and addressing scouring on sandhill ramps along the Big Red Road.
- They are also repairing scouring near the Birdsville walkway crossing to the Diamantina River, compacting material to stabilise the track.
- A contractor dozer has been stockpiling gravel in the Kamaran Pit (which was also rehabilitated), and is now working along the Boulia Road on RMPC repairs.
- He will then:
 - Head to Vaughn Johnson Lookout for drainage restoration (Flood Damage Restoration Work)
 - Begin clearing works on the detour route for the upcoming Bitumen Project (starting next financial year)
 - Finally, move onto the Diamantina Lakes Road to stockpile gravel for further Flood Damage Restoration efforts.

She will coordinate the team and other resources to ensure the optimal delivery of services while fostering a positive culture of teamwork, safety, and continuous improvement.

From Red Dirt to Red Tractor

Raised in Bedourie, Jade's story is one of dedication, resilience, and a deep connection to country. She is the embodiment of what it means to grow up in a small town, go out and explore the world, and bring back new skills and experiences to give back to the community that raised her. Jade's journey with Council began at 18 as a Labourer, soon stepping into the seat of a red tractor — a role she took on for six months that sparked her passion for outdoor work and travelling across the vast Diamantina landscape.

Between 2017 and 2020, she worked in the mines, gaining broader experience. But the connection to home never faded. With deep family roots in the region and a strong affection for Bedourie, Jade was drawn back to the place that shaped her. Over the past decade, Jade has taken on diverse roles across Council — from Administration and Stores to Plant Operator and Leading Hand. Her work ethic, adaptability and leadership skills stood out. When former Supervisor Fred Brown moved on, Jade stepped up as Acting Supervisor and proved she was ready to lead. Her promotion is a reflection of her consistent performance, attention to detail, and natural leadership abilities.



As her manager, Kev Barr, puts it: "Jade has always presented herself well at work and worked well with fellow employees. She's a self-starter, a competent plant operator, and leads by example. Promoting her to a Supervisory role was an easy decision."



A New Era of Leadership

Now overseeing a team of 11 Council employees and contractors as part of the Maintenance Crew 2, Jade brings a fresh perspective and a collaborative, community-minded leadership style. She values the strong team culture within Council and sees her new position as an opportunity to keep building that, especially for the next generation of local workers.

For Jade, it's not just about the job. It's about being part of a close-knit community. She speaks fondly of the friendships formed on the road, the beautiful Country, and the sense of family that comes from working and living in a place like the Diamantina.

As a mum to Hunter, Jade appreciates the flexibility her role offers. Bedourie is a safe and supportive place to raise a child, and the work-life balance she's found means she can be present as a parent while also growing professionally.

Inspired by Strong Women

Jade credits much of her success to her mum, Mona Smith, a long-time roller operator with Council. Mona raised Jade on her own while working hard in a male-dominated industry, always showing that gender was no barrier to getting the job done. That example set the tone for Jade's approach — confident, independent, and committed to doing the work well.

Giving Back to the Community

When she's not at work, Jade is active in the social and community life of Bedourie – from volunteering at the Camel Races, to hosting trivia nights and supporting Social Club events. For her, leadership is as much about showing up for her team as it is about showing up for her community.

Looking Ahead

Jade Smith's appointment is more than a promotion — it's a signal of change. It marks a new chapter where diversity and local knowledge are recognised as strengths, where community connections matter, and where young people especially young women — can see a path forward in the Outback.

As Jade says with quiet confidence: "It's about taking care, getting involved, and leading by example."

And that's exactly what she's doing.


