Betoota Races will kick off the Simpson Desert Racing Carnival this weekend



It's almost racing season for the Diamantina with the Simpson Desert Racing Carnival kicking off this weekend in Betoota. Betoota Race Club will be hosting the Queensland Opera for the first time in our Shire, which will be a new experience for many of us, and there will be a Friday night rodeo with all the thrills and spills that come with that.

For the first time, the four-day racing Carnival will have over half a million dollars in prize money for owners and trainers to compete for, which is very impressive. From all accounts our July events in Betoota, Birdsville and Bedourie were a great success, with two of those events being staged for the first time. The Betoota Outback Muster put this famously tiny town on the map for unique music festival experiences, while the new Birdsville Camel Carnival was three days of live music, cameleer heritage, and family entertainment. From there, the Desert Champions Way: Outback Camel Trail turned north for the always entertaining Bedourie Camel Races. And on top of all of that, Big Red Bash staged an intimate sand dune concert featuring crowd favourite, John Williamson.

Last week, CEO Julianne and I attended the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils (WACQ) in St George with state and federal politicians from both sides of the political fence. RAPAD mayors had a couple of deputations with state ministers, and we learned that an announcement is soon to be made regarding our road network. It was also announced that Diamantina Shire Council has received \$2.7 million to complete the new Bedourie residential subdivision just north of town, including streets, paths, sewerage, power and water.

Bedourie will be hosting the seven RAPAD Councils this week for the quarterly 'face-to-face' meeting, so if you see the Mayors, CEOs and other delegates around town, be sure to say g'day.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone at our race meetings. I've polished the RM Williams boots and have my pink outfit ready to go for Bedourie, so to everyone, happy racing season, and if you are a punter, I wish you luck!



Recently, the Mayor and I travelled to St George for a Western Queensland Alliance of Councils meeting. The meeting brings together Mayors and CEOs from Western Councils, as well as many other delegates from across the state, providing strong networking and advocacy opportunities.



The trip has provided an opportunity to visit many towns and see Western Queensland during a great season, with an abundance of birdlife and wildflowers. On the way home, we called into Betoota and Birdsville with visits to the Betoota Hotel and the Birdsville Bakery!

We spent this week in Bedourie, where we hosted a Regional Area Planning and Development (RAPAD) meeting. RAPAD is an alliance of central west Councils, Winton, Barcaldine, Blackall-Tambo, Barcoo, Boulia, Longreach and Diamantina. Mayors, Deputy Mayors and CEOs from these Councils travelled to Bedourie for the meeting.



During the evening, we treated delegates to an evening at the Cultural Precinct, which consisted of the Bedourie Police Tracker's Hut, laundry and shower block, and Pisé House. Our Creative Content Officer delivered a short presentation, sharing stories about the Bedourie Races of 1888, Mary Dolan-Brodie-Craigie, builder of Pisé House and former owner of the Royal Hotel, and Sergeant Walsh's ride to ensure votes in the first Federal Election of 1901, which was well received by all. Sincere thanks go to our staff who assisted with the planning, venue preparation, and organisation of this meeting.


Many of those who attended the meeting certainly noticed the quality of the roadwork when travelling over from Windorah, and we continue to get compliments about the presentation and cleanliness of our towns. These comments represent the work ethic of our teams and the pride they take in their work, as well as their commitment to the community.

Central West Hospital and Health Board held a meeting in Bedourie during the month, which I attended. It was good to meet the board members and discuss some of our challenges. The Board also visited Birdsville, and that meeting was also well attended. We plan to increase promotions of visiting health services in Desert Yarns and on social media to better reach the community with our messaging.

During the month, we also engaged with several local clubs to develop master plans for community facilities. These master plans enable a long-term, coordinated approach between Council and clubs, and will assist with funding applications and future improvements. Several consultation sessions were held, and it was pleasing to see such interest from the community.









As a small local government, one of our priorities is to maximise funding opportunities. Council has been successful in a funding application to construct roads and footpaths in Bedourie township, which will activate land for 30 new residential housing lots.

Markets were held during the month in Bedourie, and I've noticed we have some keen golfers in the community as well. Next week, I'm looking forward to spending some time in Birdsville in the lead-up to the Birdsville Races.

The Bedourie Golf Course was the perfect backdrop for some of the team to enjoy a friendly game of golf and time together.

Our staff communications have been lacking, so recently we started a Staff Newsletter, which we plan to issue fortnightly. We've managed two editions so far and are hoping to receive some feedback and good stories from our teams to include in future editions. A big thank you to our marketing team.

It is pleasing to see our staff taking an interest in supporting the local SES, as it is so important for our community in times of need. For anyone wanting to become involved but has doubts, please reach out, and I can put you in touch with the right contacts to discuss it further.

The racing season is almost upon us, and I'm sure our clubs will welcome your support if you'd like to volunteer your time to assist. Committee members and volunteers undertake a considerable amount of work to bring these events to fruition, so we are incredibly grateful for the work you do behind the scenes to bring these events to our communities.

Volunteering can be both fun and rewarding. I'll be in Betoota this weekend, volunteering at the races, so I look forward to seeing some of you there.

Our communities will be pretty busy over the next few weeks preparing for race meets in Betoota, Birdsville and Bedourie, and I'm quite excited as this will be my first opportunity to attend these meets.

Mayor's Message: Delivering for Today, Planning for Tomorrow

2025-2026 Budget

Council's 2025–2026 Budget reflects our continued commitment to responsible financial management and meaningful investment in the future of our communities. With a total income of \$22.41 million, the majority of funding is sourced from grants and contributions, followed by strong sales and recoverable revenue, with the remainder made up of rates, fees, rental, and interest income. These funds enable us to deliver vital services while maintaining long-term financial sustainability.

This year, \$26.36 million has been allocated to operating expenses, with the most considerable portion directed to maintaining and improving our road network, which accounts for 43% of total operational spending. Council has secured funding through contracts with Transport and Main Roads (TMR) and restoration grants from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA), bringing additional funds toward major road projects, including RMPC works, flood recovery, and upgrades like Allan Yards. These projects go beyond physical infrastructure; they preserve our lifestyle and create opportunities across our towns.

Council is also investing in key areas including community services, housing, fleet operations and essential infrastructure. Internal fleet recoveries have contributed to managing costs and improving operational efficiency. Through careful planning and delivery, we continue to meet the everyday needs of residents while remaining committed to sustainable progress across our region.

Our \$9.66 million capital works program will fund upgrades across the Shire, from water and plant infrastructure to community assets such as halls, airport micro surfacing, housing improvements, and new sheds for sporting and emergency services facilities. We have also allocated funding to support family day care compliance and enhancements.

To continue delivering essential services, Council has approved a 3.5% increase in general rates for residential properties. For most households, this means around \$25 more in general rates, along with moderate increases in service charges. In total, the average increase for most households on a rates notice will be approximately \$92. Rural properties may see changes depending on their rating category, with a cap in place to limit any increase. Council will continue to offer a 15% discount for ontime payments.

I would like to thank my fellow Councillors and the Diamantina Shire Council team for their dedication and hard work. To our residents, thank you for your continued support.

Together, we remain focused on sustainably developing the outback - building a stronger future, one project at a time.


Birdsville Welcomes the World: Global Story Circle with Don Rowlands


Congratulations Joel Blyth, who has stepped into the role of Birdsville Town Services Supervisor!





Prepare for locust season

Wet weather earlier this year has created ideal conditions for potential locust outbreaks across parts of Queensland. In response, Biosecurity Queensland is urging graziers, landholders and aerial contractors to take early, proactive steps now to manage the risk of locust swarms. Locusts can cause significant economic and social impacts by damaging pastures and crops, threatening local industries and communities.

It is important to remember that under the Biosecurity Act 2014, you have a general biosecurity obligation to take all reasonable steps to minimise the risk of locust populations building up on your land. Locust management is a shared responsibility, and timely action can make a difference. Early detection and targeted spraying of nymphs can help protect pastures and crops from localised damage and prevent locust swarms. There are 3 main locust species of concern in Queensland: the Australian plague locust, the spur-throated locust and the migratory locust. Locusts are native to Australia, and eradication is not possible. However, effective management is achievable through coordinated efforts.

Birdsville Police Station Update


The Mount Isa District is pleased to announce that police staffing at Birdsville Police Station is increasing from one officer to two officers.




