MAYORS REPORT

ROBBIE DARE

Dear Diamantina Community,

We are starting off the 2023 year with some very sad news being the loss of Vaughan Gregory Johnson (he called himself VG). A very great friend, champion to the whole of Queensland and in particular, the Diamantina Shire. Vaughan became Minister for transport in 1996 and immediately set about upgrading the state roads. In the Diamantina Shire, we have 540 kilometers of state roads of which 180 kilometers in low level flood prone areas and went under water in a moderate flood.

When Vaughan made the announcement at the opening of the new Glengyle Bridge on Eyre Creek on the 3rd December 1997, that he was going to do everything in his power to help Diamantina Shire get our roads sealed, it was the news we had been waiting for. With guaranteed funding and under the leadership of mayor David Brook, the shire completed upgrading plant and equipment to be the most efficient road building shire in Queensland, enabling realignments of roads onto higher country, reducing the flood prone length from 180 to approximately 70 kilometers an outstanding result. To repeat that achievement today would cost hundreds of millions of dollars.

We are eternally indebted to Vaughan Johnson for his gumption and foresight, we have appreciated his help, and the reason Diamantina Shire built and named the Vaughan Johnson lookout approximately 90 Kilometers north of Bedourie on the Boulia road - of which he was very proud.

Vaughan helped hundreds of people from all walks of life. He came and stayed with me on three occasions last year for which I feel privileged. During that time, he was still trying to improve our road network by going and seeing Neil Scales (Director General of Department of Transport) on the Barcoo Shire and on our behalf to have the Farrars Creek Channels raised.

I was proud to represent Diamantina Shire at Vaughan's funeral at Buderim. A massive crowd of approximately 1200 people as well as 750 individuals streamed in. Vaughan's family are proud of the lookout named in his honour and mentioned it in the eulogy.

Ladies and gentlemen please say a prayer for our mates soul.

VALE VAUGHAN JOHNSON

At the Council meeting on 23.1.23, the Motion of Condolence on the passing of Vaughan Johnson OAM was moved and read by the Mayor and seconded by Cr Don Rowlands, fully supported by all Councillors.

MOTION OF CONDOLENCE - on the passing of Vaughan Johnson

It is with much sadness that I move this Motion of Condolence on the passing over the weekend of our dear friend, Order of Australia recipient and former Queensland politician, Vaughan Johnson. Vaughan was 75-years-old and spent 25 years in Queensland Parliament as a member of the National Party, and subsequently the Liberal National Party. Vaughan will be remembered for many things by many people, not the least of which will be as a champion and advocate for regional Queensland.

Born in New South Wales, Mr Johnson moved to Queensland as a child. He entered politics as a councillor for Quilpie Shire in the early 1970s before he was elected to the Queensland Parliament as the member for Gregory in 1989. He held the seat for more than 25 years until his retirement in 2015, representing an area larger than Victoria and Tasmania combined. He was the minister for transport under premier Rob Borbidge from 1996-1998 and the government chief whip under Campbell Newman's government. Vaughan also held various shadow cabinet positions.

He was awarded an Order of Australia Medal in 2020 for his work with various community organisations, as drought commissioner, and for advancing the interests of regional and remote Queenslanders. He worked as a grazier and contractor prior to entering politics and was renowned as an advocate for outback industry. Vaughan was a fierce advocate for primary producers, rural communities and transport infrastructure and was a man of true character.

Our council erected and named a lookout after Vaughan in our Shire, in recognition of his advocacy for the outback and his efforts towards expanding the sealed road network in Western Queensland. This remains just one aspect of his legacy. Through this motion of condolence, we express our sincerest condolences to the Johnson family. We will miss you mate.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

ANDREW BOARDMAN - CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

This year is beginning to pick up pace with residents returning to the shire, by plane if you're returning to Bedourie! I want to take the opportunity to remind residents to take care on the roads, with the wet weather and floods, road conditions can change quickly. Remember if its flooded, forget it.

With the recent rain it appears that the Georgina river will remain high for an extended period. Council's Local Disaster Management Group (LDMG) is meeting weekly to monitor flooding and supply efforts. The concern is now that any additional rain in the saturated catchment will directly impact the roads opening. We are definitely very fortunate to have our local airline assisting our communities. I want to again thank REX Airlines for their continual support in helping ensure critical supplies are able to reach the community.

The flooding impact means as a Shire we are now officially disaster declared. This means that Council will receive Federal and State Government Support to undertake funded emergent works as well as be eligible to put in submissions to restore damaged local roads. Emergent works are being undertaken at the following locations:

<u>Birdsville-Windorah Road</u>: grader crew have undertaken patch grading in various areas, and are currently repairing a large shoulder scour near Betoota

<u>Bedourie-Boulia Road</u>: grader crews are removing silt build-up at various areas along the road <u>Coorabulka Road</u>: grader crew have undertaken patch grading in various areas along the road <u>Kamaran Road</u>: grader crew have undertaken patch grading in various areas along the road <u>Sandringham-Ethabulka</u>: grader crew have undertaken patch grading in various areas along the road

Australia Day

It was unfortunate that the official Australia Day proceedings have been postponed, however it was great to see the Bedourie Community get together for some trivia, water fights and cricket. A reminder that the official proceedings will be organised and held as soon as practicable after the road opens and the Shire's community can gather together. A community email will be sent out with the date once confirmed.

Community BBQ's

Council is excited to advise that it will be hosting community BBQ's in both Bedourie and Birdsville. These community events will help the community and Council connect over important issues in the region. Dates for these barbecues will be advised once road conditions have improved.

TV Channels Bedourie and Birdsville

Whilst there have been repairs made last year, Council are aware of reoccurring issues. Council have had expert reports received into the matter and are looking to meet with the party to understand the best option moving forward. Once confirmed Council will seek external funding to undertake a permanent solution.

Birdsville Water

Council acknowledges the additional heat in the town water supply whilst repair works are being undertaken on the cooling ponds. Officers are making attempts to repair with temporary solutions until the road opens and the plumber can attend site and repair.

SMA Inverters Birdsville and Bedourie

Council are continuing to work through the matter of systems not working with Ergon, SMA and SwitchDin, with Stuart Bourne GBA giving Council technical advice.

January where do I begin! The year is shaping up to be a brilliant one with all the much need rain within the Shire. The staff have been busy gearing up for the season. Not many tourists in at the moment due to all roads in the Shire being shut due to flooding but in saying that, we have had 83 visitors through the doors, 133 phone calls.

Birdsville Bore Works

On 19/12/2022 it was reported that Birdsville had low water pressure and the water temperature was rising despite any visible leaks at the time with pipework around town. Investigations revealed that the pipework in the cooling ponds had corroded, failed and broken meaning that water was actively leaking into the ponds and making the complete system not work. Emergency measures were put in place to temporarily fix the issue and limp the Birdsville community through the Christmas New Year period. The combined efforts of council staff, contractors and the Birdsville community meant that the community were able to have water for Christmas and the system is currently continuing to be operational, however despite this, the system still needs a permanent fix. A full report will be provided at the February meeting on moving forward.

Sand Hills and Gibber Plains

p.1-8

This country in the far western corner of Queensland is often said to have been 'opened up' by people in the wake of the search parties following the disastrous Burke and Wills expedition. For many who had lived there since time immemorial much of this land on the edge of the desert was being closed off. The traditions of the indigenous people had enabled them to withstand freezing cold and searing heat. They survived extended droughts, when much of the natural food supply vanishes, and they dealt with the floods that turn the channels into sheets of water and the land itself virtually disappears. Theirs was an oral tradition and the nineteenth century European men who set out knew nothing of their ways of survival.

Charles Sturt passed through the Birdsville area in September and October 1845. When he surveyed the area from 'a cliff' it could possibly have been from the high ridge later known as The Bluff and in more recent times, as Roseberth. Certainly he was there at a dry time. That expedition was another attempt to solve the riddle of the inland, and to find the inland sea, if there was one. Sturt and his team travelled from Adelaide. They crossed what Sturt reported to be a sea of sand and a stony desert, country that would be forever 'Sturt's Stony Desert'. His description of the desert must have been surprising to southerners:

The stones indeed lay so thick on the ground, that it was impossible for any herb to have forced its way between them...The whole expanse appeared to be as level as the ocean, nor had it as far as we could see a single shrub or a blade of vegetation upon it.

Sturt followed the Mulligan for four days, passing through country that is now Annandale Station as far north as what is now Kaliduwarry Station.



Charles Sturt (1795-1869), who crossed the Stony Desert, named Cooper Creek and Eyre Creek, and by 1845 reached what would be the western part of Diamantina Shire.


FROM THE BLUE BOOK



In 1860 Robert O'Hara Burke was commissioned by the Royal Society of Victoria to lead a Victorian Exploring Expedition. Burke's large party left Melbourne on 20 August 1860. Some resigned almost immediately, and Wills, the astronomer and surveyor, was made second-in-command. Burke's despatch from camp 65 on Cooper's Creek dated 13 December 1860 stated that he would go the following day with the party, to Eyre's Creek (named by Sturt to honour his friend, the explorer Edward John Eyre but now more often referred to as the Mulligan), to explore the country north to the Gulf.

Wright's Diary records that the party had a Christmas celebration on Gray's Creek on 24 December and left 'to cross the earthy rotten plains in the direction of Eyre's Creek' the next day. ... Burke and Wills both perished. Four search parties were sent out from various directions to the interior of the continent in search of the 'lost exploring party' that included Burke and Wills, John King and Gray. Alfred Howitt, a station-owner in New South Wales, left with his party from Melbourne on 20 June 1861 for the Paroo. Howitt found King alive on 15 September, 'wasted to a shadow, sitting disconsolately in a black's gunyah'. King led Howitt to Wills' remains which he buried. A few days later they found the body of Burke and buried him.

When John McKinlay, leader of the South Australian Burke Relief Expedition, heard of the rescue of John King and the recovery of the bodies of Burke and Wills, he decided to explore further north of the Cooper. In the channels of the Diamantina, McKinlay's party went through what would later be Coongie Station, Pandie Pandi and Cadelga Downs. McKinlay probably crossed the Queensland border a few miles east of the later site of Birdsville, in a very good season. They followed up the eastern side of the river that would later be named the Diamantina by Landsborough and George Phillips, through country where Monkira, Davenport Downs and Diamantina Lakes stations were formed. The whole party, despite hardships and some desperate meals of horseflesh and camel, had survived what William Landsborough was to refer to as 'a glorious trip'. McKinlay had been the first to take camels, bullocks and sheep to the Gulf, and he had paved the way for many pastoralists.

The Qld Pastoral Leases Act of 1869 gave twenty-one years' tenure to squatters at a low nominal rental, in a bid to encourage settlement in the land beyond the Settled Districts. Pastoralists steadily moved to the far West, and a few intrepid ones reached the land that was watered, at least in good seasons, by the Diamantina and Mulligan Rivers and by Eyre Creek, the latter formed by the Hamilton, the Burke and the Georgina or Herbert. Pastoralists had found the Channel Country.



But that was in the good old days when men were straight and true,
But in these days of crawlers, low wages, lower scabs,
Rolling plains of pebbles and mud-holes full of crabs.

You'll find that it has terrors that townsfolk ne'er will know,
And should you go a-droving you may chance to find it so,
For the Diamantina River is a hell on earth that's lost,
And you'll think the same as I do that the game's not worth the cost.



Diagnostic Notes

Body length of workers (highly variable - Polymorphic) 1.8 - 3.5 mm. This ant is dark brown to blackish brown, and usually with a conspicuous yellow area mediobasally. A relatively large Monomorium species; Body yellowish brown to reddish brown from head to postpetiole; gaster blackish brown. Mandibles each with 4 teeth, the basalmost sometimes obscure. Eyes large, each with around 20 facets. Median paired carinae of clypeus obscure, Metanotal groove distinct, Propodeum with angulate posterodorsal border; the area of petiolar insertion carinate. Ventral outline of petiole less convex than in other species. Postpetiole 1.1 -1.2 times as long as broad. Mesopleuron and sections of lateral surfaces of propodeum with fine puncturation; dorsal surface of propodeum with transverse rugae.


